# Ellie Howes – Transitions Co-ordinator, Romsey Mill

Romsey Mill is a Cambridge-based Christian charity working with some of the most disadvantaged young people and families in the area [for more details, go to: www.romseymill.org].

Through the North Cambridge Council of Churches, St Andrews donates £1,000 a year to support Ellie Howes who is the current coordinator of the Transitions Programme. She helps 10-14 year-olds increase their self-esteem and confidence, raise their aspirations, and develop their skills. She does this through out-of-school groups, outdoor activities, peer mentoring, 1:1 work across the primary-secondary transition, and a literacy support programme.

Ellie recently met with some of our young people in *Why Group* and Junior Church and share with them the experiences of starting at a new school as well as some of the activities used by the project. *Why Group* has pledged to raise extra money for Ellie with a car wash on 20<sup>th</sup> July and future cake sales. # May 2008 Giving Day

We raised £1059.92 in support of the Cambridge Cancer Help Centre, which supports people who have, or have had, cancer or other serious illnesses, as well as their carers, families and friends.

Founded in 1986, the Centre offers a safe place where people with cancer can meet each other, discover they are not alone, and give one another mutual support. New purpose-built accommodation for the Centre recently opened in the grounds of Scotsdales Garden Centre, Great Shelford. Funds are still needed to complete the furnishing of the interior and to provide the necessary equipment for its activities.

## **Environment Sunday – 8 June 2008**

St Andrew's has been supporting a project in Cusco, Peru, to build a home for street children. Just before Christmas the first children arrived to live at **Azul Wasi** (Blue House). There are nine boys now ranging from age 4 to 17. They attend the village school and are enjoying life in the country. The latest addition to their family is a cow, to provide milk. They have been building a bakery and a greenhouse so that they can be more self-sufficient and also be able to sell their products.
