Evolving Art - Cambridge Open Studios #COSart2021



The region's largest art event is back this July.

Cambridge Open Studios has announced the 2021 dates for its month-long summer art event, which will feature an exciting range of exhibitions by over 300 artists at a selection of locations in the city and surrounding areas. This year there will be 40 new members taking part in the region.

For many artist members it will be Open Studios as usual with exhibitors opening their doors to the public over the four weekends in July. Some artists have chosen to 'open by appointment' and others have opted to participate with 'open windows' where artworks will be displayed in windows and outside spaces such as gazebos.

In addition to home studios, Cambridge Open Studios are delighted to be partnering with The Pitt Building located on Trumpington Street in the heart of historic Cambridge. The Pitt Building will be hosting a wide range of artists adhering to COVID guidelines over the course of the four weekends.

Nine art galleries in the regions will also be hosting resident Open Studios artists over the course of the four weekends. For many artists 2020 was a year for creating and surviving the pandemic. This year is set to be an explosion of colour and fine array of work with specialisms including fine art, photography, pottery, glass making, sculpture, illustration, textiles, jewellery and furniture making, and more besides.

Full details of how artists will be participating can be found in the artist's E-Guide Book listing and on the App. Visit <https://www.camopenstudios.co.uk/> to download the E-Guide Book and 2021 App. The distinctive yellow COS flags will be out to identify participating studios. The weekends are: July 3/4, 10/11, 17/18 and 24/25. Studios are open to visit between 11am and 6pm except those opting to take visitors via appointment.

Visitors are guaranteed a warm and friendly welcome with absolutely no pressure whatsoever to buy. All Cambridge Open Studios including The Pitt Building and participating art galleries are completely free to visitors for all ages.

'Help at Hand' app for Arthur Rank Hospice Charity's patients



Arthur Rank Hospice Charity's patients are benefitting from a new community information app which will help them to access everything from exercise classes to wellbeing support groups, telephone helplines to mental health services and much more!

It is the first time a Hospice has adopted the 'Help at Hand' app, which functions like a digital directory offering social prescribing. It can be accessed via mobile phone, device or computer and provides a safe, quick and efficient way to signpost Hospice users – patients, family and friends - to the community organisations and groups they need most.

The interface is simple to use, with clickable links allowing users to quickly contact organisations by telephone or email, and web addresses which open to provide further details. If someone has favourite services, these can be saved and shared.

The mobile phone app is free and can be downloaded from the App Store on Apple or Play Store on Android devices. An online version can also be reached on Arthur Rank Hospice Charity's at arhc.org.uk/helpathand. The organisations, charities, groups and services signposted from the app, have all been listed by the Charity, building on existing relationships and partnerships established by Hospice colleagues who support patients across the breadth of its services.

The implementation of 'Help at Hand' is the final outcome of a collaborative Community Mapping Project undertaken by John Lewis Partner (employee) Sally Milligan over 20 weeks, whilst on Golden Jubilee Trust Secondment from her usual role. The App had originally launched as an NHS patient app in 2020 by Andrew Kellard, Managing Director of brand design consultancy AKA. His vision has always been for the app to help ease the burden on healthcare providers, supporting patients' health and wellbeing through a brand-new way of social prescribing.

To access the App via your mobile, search for 'Help at Hand community info' in Apple's App Store or the Android Play Store – find the purple logo and click download. Alternatively visit arhc.org.uk/helpathand

Feeling a bit low? Join a creative arts course to improve your mental health!

Local charity Cambridge Community Arts run a wide range of part-time creative arts courses for adults in Cambridgeshire. Evidence shows that joining in improves mental wellbeing, reduces feelings of loneliness, and can even help you get back to work. In September there are year-long courses that lead to a Level 2 Qualification – these are in Photography, Visual Arts, Digital Art & Design, Music for Performance, Music Production and Drama.

Come and meet us at our Open Day on Tuesday 13 July from 1-4pm at Arbury Community Centre. You will have the chance to meet us, course tutors and past learners to find out more.

Denise took part in a Visual Arts course and commented *“It improved my self-esteem, made me have something to look forward to in my week. Doing something I enjoy has made me feel happy, which is rare. Great experience”*.

A wide range of shorter courses lasting 8 weeks will also be available – both in person and on-line for those who find travelling a challenge. Full details and application form can be found on www.camcommarts.org.uk or ring 07763 280029.

Our courses are for adults 19+. Priority is given to those with health conditions, disabilities and/or caring responsibilities. Short courses are free for those on means tested benefits or low income.

Do you have breathing difficulties? Did you know singing can help?

Singing is a great way to improve the way you breathe and get the best from your lung capacity. The Cambridge Singing for Breathing group is meeting online, using Zoom, on Thursday afternoons, 2.30 – 4.00.

Kay Barrett has been leading the group for local community music charity Talking in Tune since May 2016. She says:

You don't need any singing experience to take part. It's all about what it feels like, not what it sounds like. The camaraderie of the group, the guided relaxation, the breathing exercises and the singing are so much appreciated by everyone, and the health benefits transfer over into daily life.

The move to meeting online has worked really well for us. Singers can join from the comfort of their own home, even when they are feeling unwell.

You need to turn off your microphone when we sing together, but that can be very liberating! You simply copy what you hear the leader singing, call and response style. We also make use of multi-track recordings, so we can continue to enjoy rounds and harmonies.

Do I have to pay?

Those who can afford it are invited to give a £3.50 donation each week, but this is not essential – we want everyone to be able to come.

Do I have to come every week?

We know that appointments, sickness, family commitments and such can get in the way! Just come when you can.

I have Long Covid, can I join?

The gentle pace and the breathing exercises and relaxation can be very beneficial, but do check with your doctor or respiratory physio, especially if your symptoms are severe. Do call Kay if you are unsure.

Can you help? Sharon Tipp is looking for donations for Kenya Help Charity.

Please see some information below about Sharon and her charity.

“My husband and I travelled to Kenya 10 years ago for a holiday. We saved a little boy who was seriously ill with Malaria, we saved his life, which cost £6. After seeing so much poverty, I now go to Kenya at least once a year, my last trip was November 2020. We mainly care for children. We have 26 children we care for at the moment, (19 are in school), we also feed and help the villages, when we go to Kenya. I found the children in their villages, either orphaned or in desperate need of help. The children now speak English, which is great as they can tell mamma any problems, (they call me mamma).

We travel from Heathrow to Turkey, Turkey to Mombasa, then the ferry across the river to Diani Beach. I sometimes have volunteers, who travel to Kenya with us, we take approximately 20 cases, the airline let us have extra luggage.

We finance our hotel and flights, we cannot stay in the villages, as there are no water or toilets. Every penny we raise goes towards school fees, feeding the villagers, repairing huts, which I personally sort out when we arrive in Kenya. We do not have any administration costs, as everything is given voluntarily from my family and friends. We have raised money to pay for extra suitcases this year, although the airline donate travel allowance, we need to take as much as possible. We cut and halve the suitcases once we are in Kenya, for babies and small children to sleep, rather than sleep on the ground. We look after children from babies to adulthood. We also bring some clothing for adults. Stationery is a much needy item. I really do appreciate any help you can give at all. You can go on Facebook, Kenya Help Charity (which my daughter updates frequently) and you will see photos of the items we give out.”

Pick up a copy of the new song and verse book that captures and celebrates stories in north Cambridge

Songs and Verses from North Cambridge is a new song and verse book and the latest in a series of arts projects commissioned and supported by The Chesterton Partnership developing Cambridge North.

Led by award-winning composer and artist Emily Peasgood, the project collaborated with local people to create 34 songs and verses that tell the stories from the many communities in and around North Cambridge.

Inspired by the tradition of folk songs that were kept alive by word of mouth, changing, and evolving as time passed, the book captures what it is like to live in North Cambridge and what makes the area unique. The resulting collection of songs and verses ranges from poignant ballads to comic verses covering subjects including mental health, dating in CB4 and an escaped python.

The book focuses on the CB4 postal area which comprises Arbury, Chesterton, Kings Hedges, Orchard Park, Cambridge Business Park and Cambridge North train station, telling stories of a diverse range of people aged between 8 and 84 and preserving them for future generations.

Emily had to adapt plans for in-person song and verse creation workshops when the pandemic hit, but after issuing an open call for ideas was flooded with submissions from local people keen to tell their story. She and her song writing team of Anna Hester Skelton and Bob Hines then worked with the contributors to translate the ideas which encompass diverse genres of music and spoken word.

The songs and verses are available in a beautifully illustrated hardback book that will be distributed to Cambridgeshire Libraries, local schools and community groups. The public can also pick up a copy for free from the locations listed below. With the exception of two pieces, the book is available for the community to use in any way, license free in order to preserve and share the stories of this community.

Emily Peasgood, lead artist said:

"This was an extremely ambitious project, more so for undertaking the whole thing online. But it hasn't suffered because of it. The resulting book is thoughtful and demonstrates the community spirit in a pocket of Cambridge that's often overlooked. It feels surreal that I still haven't met any of the local people in person and I'm looking forward to meeting them all in July!"

Sven Topel, CEO of Brookgate said:

"We see public art and collaborations like Songs and Verses from North Cambridge as an important part in of our development process. They help us learn about and communicate with the communities we are developing and that helps shape great places for people to live, work and socialise."

News from the Churches

St Andrew's Church

Like all of us as individuals and organisations St Andrew's has been carefully dipping its toes in the water as we move towards something more like normality. The feast of Pentecost saw our first coming together at 10am on Sunday mornings for a while. We held the service outside in the churchyard – this meant that we could all join in with the hymns (how we have missed singing together) and could be together without face masks. The wind only intruded when it blew on cue as the passage recounting the coming Holy Spirit was read, and it was lovely to be joined in our singing by the birds!

We will have another go outside (weather permitting) at 10am on 20 June when the service will include a Confirmation.

Our largest indoor gathering since the pandemic began (a covid capacity of 65) was for an evening



service on 16 May to say farewell to Kathryn Waite, our curate of the past four years. Kathryn will be inducted as the vicar of Sawston and Babraham on 22 June. There were moving tributes to her ministry amongst us and a

presentation was made (that included a labyrinth made at the Rowan arts centre).

We are sad to report that Peter Welham, a longstanding member of our congregation, died in May after a long illness. Peter and his wife Jean have been the faces of the church (in their capacity as vergers) for those who have come to St Andrew's for funerals and weddings over the past quarter century.

We are holding a couple of lunchtime concerts in the next month or two. The first will have passed by the time you read this, but children from Chesterton Community College will be performing at 12.30pm on Thursday 8 July.

We are planning a big weekend to celebrate the restoration of the organ on 11-12 September with an inaugural recital on the Saturday evening and a service of dedication with the Bishop of Ely on the Sunday at 10am.

That, we hope, will launch us into the autumn with a sense of rejoicing as we mark a new beginning both for the organ and for us all

Minister's Letter

One year when I was in secondary school, a group of people I knew got up a petition that we were all asked to sign. I still remember being cornered at the end of English class and given the clipboard. The BBC had decided to reduce the Australian soap opera *Neighbours* to one slot a day, that would play at lunchtime. These were the days before every house had a video recorder and some regular viewers were outraged. We had lost our chill out time after returning from school. How would we catch up on what was happening?

Neighbours has been a remarkably successful soap and other British home-grown versions have succeeded, not just because we are interested in the lives of others, but because we are interested in how neighbours interact with each other. Each street and community are fertile ground for writers as there are so many different life stories to be explored. How those differences rub up against each other is played out in the Queen Vic and in the Rover's Return, to the watching delight of generations.

This year, Covid has had the weird effect of expanding our horizons to a world view, as all of the globe is affected. To emphasise this the news recently reported that covid cases were growing even on Mount Everest. Much of the talk of vaccine equality has

been about the populations of the world needing to be good neighbours to one another.

At the same time as this growing worldwide awareness there has been a shrinking of our horizons to the local, as people have been told to stay at home and local WhatsApp groups have flourished. Many people have reported getting to know their neighbours as never before. When previously they might just have nodded in passing, now they lingered to chat to one another at the end of the Thursday clap for carers.

I have loved being part of the neighbourhood of Chesterton for the last nine years and, if anything, the growth of stronger local ties and greater knowledge of neighbours makes me realise quite how much I will really miss it, as I am moving on from being Vicar of St George's this summer, with my last service at the beginning of August. Working together in the community, creating the Chesterton News, planning and setting up for the Chesterton Festival and developing St George's as a community venue with films and circus performances has been a huge amount of fun. The desire to get to know others and to delight in all the variety of our differences has been a huge joy. Thank you for all of it. I couldn't have wished for better neighbours. Much better than watching about them on the TV!
